**Peter Robertshaw**, Professor (Cambridge University, PhD. 1980)

My publications on bananas stemmed from the discovery of evidence of bananas dating back to earlier than 3000 BC in a sediment core that I and my colleagues collected in Uganda. This research gathered some attention; it was discussed in *Nature* and in the London *Times* newspaper, as well as in the popular article that I wrote for the magazine *Archaeology* (cited above). My publication on glass beads is part of a much larger project with many collaborators that has involved the chemical analysis of more than 1000 glass beads found on archaeological sites scattered across Africa dating between about AD 750 and 1500. The purpose of this project has been to use chemistry to identify the regions where the glass was first manufactured and thereby reconstruct changing patterns of trade across the Indian Ocean to Africa.
